The following statistics pertain to the jurisdictions of New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia and Victoria for the reporting period ending January 2016.



The graph represents the volume of consumer transfers<sup>2</sup> for each month in the respective jurisdictions over a 2 year rolling window.






## 2. Historical Monthly Annualised Transfer Rate
